



On Monday 7th November, The Social Mobility Foundation (SMF) delivered a talk to 19 of our top-performing Year 12 students. The SMF supports students into top universities and coveted professions and provides the means and networks to make this a reality. The students enrolled on their Aspiring Professionals Programme (APP) will receive additional university application support, internships with employers, professional mentoring, and tailored skills sessions and career workshops. The APP gives students from low-income backgrounds the skills, guidance and confidence to access and thrive in higher education and top careers.

In previous years, students taking part in this programme have routinely gained places at Russell Group Universities and have landed jobs in a range of highly-regarded professions. This year, we have more eligible students than normal, which is testament to the excellent GCSE grades our students achieved last year.



Many congratulations to Deshaun Gager Brewley in 13HLR for being nominated as an 'Outstanding Achiever' by his peers and awarded the Jack Petchey Award for November 2022.

These awards are to recognise a personal triumph for someone who has faced a challenge, a young person who has pushed themselves outside of their comfort zone or it may be an opportunity to recognise the outstanding efforts of a team player.

The award winner receive a certificate, pin badge and a book from Sir Jack himself. They also choose how to spend a £300 grant to benefit their school or organisation. Well done Deshaun

Art & Design Trip - Ms Ancilotto

This week the Y12L2 Art and Design class went to visit some arts venues. First, they had the opportunity to enjoy some great examples of urban art in Leake Street Arches. They then head to the Victoria and Albert Museum to see first-hand more examples of art and design from the past centuries.

Students were excited to recognise some of the artworks they have been researching over the past weeks and they were amazing at transferring their knowledge into observational skills.



The dangers of gambling and gaming addiction

On Tuesday Year 12 had a visit from the company 'Nowt Left to Lose' and a presentation from Ryan Pitcher on the dangers of gambling, gaming and cyber bullying. Nowt Left to Lose is an educational platform that provides awareness and knowledge of gambling-related harms to help prevent addiction and associated trauma.

The feedback from the students has been overwhelmingly positive, with many pointing out that harm among women is prevalent within our sessions. One student wrote, 'my favourite part of the session was displaying women that gamble, as it shows a part of gambling not usually seen among society.' Dozens of other evaluation forms referenced this particular section and the insights given.

Year 12 found the presentation very interesting and informative.



Mock Interviews - Mr Olumegbon

All students were given the opportunity to have a mock job interview with a professional. In order to make the experience as real as possible, students were given a choice of jobs to 'apply for' and spent some time preparing for the interview in advance with their form tutors. The Career team set up a reception and waiting room where students nervously waited to be called for interview.

After the interview, students had a discussion with the interviewer about what went well and what could have been improved. They also received valuable written feedback from the interviewer.









News from the world of Science - Dr Kruppa

The science department is considering buying a new microscope. The model we are aiming for has a digital camera for taking photos and videos. Why are microscopes so important? Microscopy as a science really took off due to the work of Antonie van Leeuwenhoek from Holland in the 17th Century. The lenses he made were far superior to any available at the time and with them, he was able to make the first observations of bacteria and other microscopic life. Van Leeuwenhoek knew the small objects he observed were living, because he could see them moving and movement is characteristic of life structure.

Even stationary cells exhibit movement within their cell structure. However, perhaps because he was not a trained scientist, many were at first suspicious of his claim that a vast unseen world of life exists all around us. Now of course we understand that although some microorganisms are harmful, all life on earth is dependent on our microscopic cousins. They recycle the nutrients in the biosphere and maintain the composition of the atmosphere. Their existence and the roles they play would have remained unnoticed without the invention of the microscope.

Dear Parents and Carers

Re: Children attending clubs outside school

We recognise that your child's engagement with extra-curricular activities and clubs has never been more important, particularly given the opportunities they missed as a result of the pandemic. We all know how much enjoyment they get from being involved with sporting activities and the physical and mental health benefits they provide. However, to maximise this enjoyment their safety and care when taking part must be considered and paramount.

When deciding on the right club for your child, please ensure that you check that the club is affiliated to a national body, for example the British Gymnastics Association. Affiliation to a national body provides assurance that those delivering the activity meet the professional standards and follow the safeguarding expectations of the national body, hence providing the level of protection you and we would want for your child. Also check if the club has any accreditations. This can either be Clubmark accreditation from Sport England or an accreditation from the sport's national governing body or from Active Surrey. The achievement of this accreditation means the club meets minimum operating standards for a safe and effective sports environment.
