The Year 12 students have been quite busy with mock exams, assessments and a number of trips this term.

Our careers programme has given our students opportunities to explore different careers paths during our careers fair, Skills London, mock interviews during IEAP day and with work experience visits.

The Level 3 students are now organising their work experience placement for February and so far there is a variety of placements already confirmed such as, Dexters Estate Agency, AFC Wimbledon, Multiplex Construction, Boots, Brookes Architects, NHS (St Georges' Hospital) and many more.

The Travel & Tourism students also had the chance to visit Winter Wonderland last week where they were able to apply the skills learned in lessons about the entertainment sector and had a great time enjoying the park.

Work experience visits

As part of their careers programme, the Level 2 students were fortunate to visit Dexters Estate Academy in Pimlico and Multiplex construction in Vauxhall.

Dexters is the biggest estate agency in London and are keen to employ young people. We had the chance to speak with an ex- student that is now a senior lettings consultant. He shared his journey and encouraged them to apply for an apprenticeship when they finish school. We also visited different departments and learned about their job roles within the company.



Multiplex construction offered us the opportunity to visit the Design and Build of the R&F Properties development. City Tower is a 58 storey building and River Tower is a 42 storey building that will also be occupied by a luxury hotel at the newly-developed Nine Elms district in Vauxhall. Wearing the 5 points PPE we explored the impressive buildings as construction is almost done after seven years. We learned about the ins and outs of constructing a building of that magnitude and how many people need to be involved. We visited a few flats, the hotel rooms and its facilities. Students had the opportunity to take pictures and enjoy amazing views of London. The construction is due to finish in February.

We are looking forward to visiting other companies in the new year like the Metro Bank.

Next week there will be a prize draw for Year 7 and Year 8 students, for members that have attended and have a full card stamped.




Book Recommendations - Ms Sulliman

This week, **Mrs Frost** is recommending '**The Personal Librarian**' **by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray**. Mrs Frost recommended this piece of historical fiction as the focus of the novel, Belle da Costa Greene, had to live a double-life in order to pursue her ambitions. As a reader, Mrs Frost felt like she was the only one who knew the true Belle as sadly, Belle had to hide her heritage from her colleagues and friends. During Belle's lifetime (1879-1950) she would not have been welcome in high-society due to her ethnicity. As a result, she presents herself as Portuguese in order to work as a curator for JP Morgan. This presents inner-conflict and frustrations from her family and makes the novel a thought-provoking read.

As with all recommendations, Mrs Frost has encouraged students to seek her out to discuss 'The Personal Librarian', if they choose to read it!

Think about where you go

You probably know about the places in town or near your home or school that have a lot of conflict or violence. Stay away from them. If you're not there, you can't get caught up in whatever's happening.

Find a new focus

Whether it's a creative activity like making music, or something physical like boxing or football, finding something you enjoy doing will not only help you avoid dangerous situations, but you'll be able to build new skills, meet different people, and pave the way for your bright future.
