Across two separate weeks, 50 students from China are spending the week at Southfields Academy. Each of the students in the group, ranging from Year 7 to Year 12, are shadowing a Southfields student so that they get to experience life as a student, in all its glory!

The first group, last week, were welcomed with a special assembly with their buddies. Ms Marshall led the assembly and they had a special welcome from Ms Valin. Following a short tour, they attended lessons, break clubs and assemblies with their buddies. They also had a bespoke schedule of activities as part of a personalised IEAP Day. Their week ended with a farewell assembly delivered by Ms Valin, where all students received a participation certificate.

Feedback from Southfields students and staff has been extremely positive - with them all commenting on how enthusiastic and resilient the Chinese students were. In fact, a number of Southfields students have volunteered to support the visitors having come across them around the Academy! By hosting the visitors, students have been able to practise and develop their communication and leadership skills. Perhaps even more pleasingly, the Chinese students and their accompanying teachers have shared how enjoyable they found the visit.

The second group of students will be with us for the final week before half term (w/c 5th February), and will have a similar week as the initial group. After the visit to Southfields, each group of visiting students are going on to visit other cities and schools in the UK and Scotland.

#### Science Club – Ms El Maadi

This week science club became Microbiologists. They investigated how clean their hands and phones are.

They used a swab and some petri dishes to take a sample from their hands or phones. These samples will go in an incubator and next week the students will get to see what kind of bacteria (if any) is present.

Bacteria like a temperature of around 37 degrees Celsius. Schools can only grow bacteria at 25 degrees Celsius so nothing harmful will grow!





#### Theatre Season @ IG

1,2,3.. and it's theatre season at IG. As the term draws to an end, we thought it might be a good idea to spruce things up and take just over 50 history IG students out for a cultural experience to the theatre to see a play called *The Most Precious of Goods* at the Marylebone Theatre in Baker Street.

The play was mainly performed by Olivier Award-winner **Samantha Spiro**, who is currently in the acclaimed movie *One Life* with Anthony Hopkins and who recently starred in the Netflix hit *Sex Education*. Together, with cellist Gemma Rosefield who performed a live score; they brought to the stage Jean-Claude Grumberg's best-selling French language novella, *The Most Precious of Goods*.

Story telling at its most profound, this stage adaptation was directed and translated by Nicolas Kent and opened at the Marylebone Theatre on 23 January 2024, to coincide with National Holocaust Memorial Day on 27 January. Told with a fairy tale-like lyricism, this gripping story of love and hope, set against the terrible backdrop of the Holocaust, reminds us that humanity can be found in the most inhumane of places.

## Winter 1943, a forest in war-torn Eastern Europe: a poor woodcutter's wife finds a little bundle thrown into the snow from a moving goods' train. It contains something for which she has always yearned, but...

Our students were not only able to witness this unique performance as the theatre piece was read as a story to the audience through the powerful acting of Spiro, who was able to project an array of prominent themes such as humanity, love and sanctuary through the simple power of storytelling- but much of it was left to their imagination!

Post show, we stayed for the Q&A session and our students asked about the creative choices the Director, Nicolas Kent, had made in choosing how the play was performed and his own relationship with the French playwright Jean-Claude Grumberg, a Holocaust survivor. It was also a great opportunity for students to hear about the life of Anne Frank from *Gillian Walnes Perry M.B.E. (Author of The Legacy of Anne Frank).* 

Next week, thanks to our Jack Petchey Award winner, Abdulqadir Hassan, another group of lucky IG students will enjoy the hit musical Hamilton and go on yet another theatre trip as part of the IG theatre season.



#### Staff Book Recommendations – Ms Sulliman



#### MFL – Where are we all from?


The different year groups worked on collaborative maps to find out where their classmates and their families are from. Y8 added 96 pins, Y9 added 104 and Y7, 116 pins!
